Listen to a range of voices

- Talk to teachers, tutors and even older boys who do the subject. More intricate questions can also be posed to the HOD.
- An aptitude test gives an indication of a sphere of interest and ability, guiding subject choice.
- Do some research of university requirements.
(but remember these may change before he is in matric)
- A planned career doesn't start next year and may change many times.

- Do something for which you have a passion.
 - Wildlife photography
 - Formula 1 mechanic
- By the time they are 30, there will be careers available that don't even exist today - they need to be **educated** to access these.
- Knowledge changes so quickly these days that the most important thing they learn at school is **how to learn**.



Bad reasons for choosing a subject

- Trying to be in class with your friends.
- Copying my parent's career.
- Trying to be with your favourite teacher.
 - You may not have the same teacher you have now all the way to matric.
- Too focused on a specific career.
 - What if it changes?

Good reasons for choosing a subject

- Keep a good balance.
- What do I love doing?
- What subjects am I good at?
- Can I handle the hours working on practical work?

UNIVERSITY EXPECTATIONS

“Bachelor’s Pass”

- Pass matric (NSC)
- Four subjects above 50%
- In the last 6 years, 19 of 864 boys haven’t achieved a Bachelor’s pass

- Competitive nature of university acceptance means that these minimum requirements are mostly irrelevant.
- Each university has its own entrance requirements

Recommended subjects

- Medicine -- Maths, Physical Sciences & Life Sciences.
- Arts (BA) -- Maths or Maths Literacy
- Sciences (BSc) -- Maths and Physical Sciences. Life Sciences if you wish to study Biological Sciences.
- BComm -- Maths and English
- Education -- Maths or Maths Literacy
- Engineering -- Maths and Physical Sciences
- Law -- Maths or Maths Literacy

Advice

- A broad foundation gives you options and a range of competencies
- A passion for learning; self-discipline; learning competencies are most important
- Very few subjects are actually required
- Check admission requirements (“points”) for universities of interest
- NBT assessments

Core subjects

- English (at home language level)
- Afrikaans (at first additional language level)
 - or French for those with FAL exemption (at second additional language level)
- Life Orientation

- **Choose 3 more subjects**
 - **All subjects offered by Bishops are “designated subjects”**

Mathematics

- Testing learned procedures compared to integration of ideas and solving non-routine problems.
- Extra lessons may help learning procedures but the boys develop mathematical reasoning by being active participants in challenging themselves with questions at the edge of their understanding.
- You should be achieving above 60% for grade 9 Maths to comfortably take Physical Sciences; IT or Accounting
- We will give every boy a chance at Maths.
- and **AP Maths** (by invitation)

Mathematical Literacy

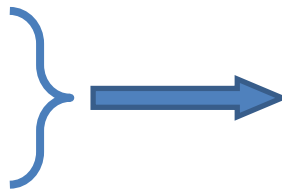
- Pursuing Maths when it becomes soul-destroying is not useful.
- We usually start grade 10 giving all boys a chance at Maths, and end matric with about 20 boys doing Maths Literacy.
- Maths Literacy is driven by life-related applications and contexts so that scholars can
 - understand information presented in mathematical ways;
 - engage critically with mathematically-based arguments in daily life.

Mathematical Literacy

- Advantages of Maths Literacy
 - Feeling of relief
 - Other subjects improve as more time is available
 - Boys learn ideas required in other subjects
- Please check the impact of Maths Literacy on university requirements. Check more than one university.

Changing subjects later?

- Possible until mid-year grade 11
- Less than ideal. Work has to be caught up.
- Some subjects cannot be chosen later (e.g. IT or Art)
- Changing Maths to Maths Literacy is feasible.

Doing an extra subject?

- Our timetable is premised on 6 subjects and LO
- They are encouraged to make an arrangement, often with one of our teachers. This is dependent on the good-will of the teacher, and involves a cost to parents.
- Marks are included on the report card
- Evaluate motives for doing the extra subject
- Apart from that, the school takes no responsibility for the provision of those lessons or their sustainability.

Minimum promotion (or NSC) requirements

To gain the NSC you need:

40%	English
40%	two other subjects
30%	three other subjects

} This involves 6 subjects,
but all candidates take at least 7

What can we do as parents

- Encourage independence, responsibility
 - Requiring self-discipline
 - Meeting of deadlines
 - Work before play
- Introduce them to the real world of work
 - Talk about work related issues
 - Ask their opinion
 - Read the newspaper
- Reflect on our own thinking
 - Face our own unreasonable expectations and limiting beliefs
 - Never re-live our lives through our children; honour their individuality
 - Assist (not do) their research, double-check the details – i.e. “project manage”
