In addition, the evidence is so much more damning, not because the transgressions have changed that much from 30 years ago, but because the communication of them is so much more than word of mouth. Photos, videos, cruel statements etc can be put out there in a moment of folly and, once out and about, can often not be effectively withdrawn.

How we respond to this challenge in the lives of our sons depends upon their age.
